AN ACT

Appropriating for the operating and capital expenses of the state government; and providing for an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

* Section 1. Included within the general fund amounts appropriated according to the schedules in secs. 9, 10, and 11 of this Act, the following amounts are from the unreserved special accounts in the general fund:

- * Sec. 2. A sum is appropriated from the general fund necessary to pay interest on revenue anticipation notes issued by the commissioner of revenue under AS 43.08.010.
- * Sec. 3. If the amount required under applicable statutes for refunds of shared taxes and revenues to eligible political subdivisions exceeds the estimates appropriated by this Act, the excess is appropriated.
- * Sec. 4. If federal or other program receipts fall short of the estimates appropriated by this Act, the affected appropriation shall be reduced by the amount of the shortfall in receipts.
- * Sec. 5. If federal or other program receipts exceed the estimates appropriated by this Act, the appropriation from state funds for the affected program may be reduced by the amount of the excess if the reductions are not inconsistent with applicable federal statutes.
 - * Sec. 6. Section 5(a), ch. 142, SLA 1974 is amended to read:

Chapter 153

Sec. 5(a). Notwithstanding the provisions of AS 37.-25.020, an appropriation made from the "1974 Rural School Construction Fund" shall have a project life as follows:

* Sec. 7. Notwithstanding AS 37.25.010(a), the appropriation of \$200,000 made to the Department of Public Works by sec. 18(b), ch. 279 SLA 1976 for the purpose of funding SB 201 (Elimination of architectural barriers in public buildings) is continued for fiscal year 1978 and lapses into the general fund on June 30, 1978.

The following items of legislative intent accompany the Free Conference Committee Substitute for CSHB 52:

EDUCATION:

Radio Station KT00. (\$50.0). The appropriation to Radio Station KT00 is to match with federal funds for the purchase of Quadraplex Video Tape Recorders.

UNIVERSITY OF ALASKA:

U of A Symphony. (\$20.0). This appropriation to the U of A Symphony is for the purchase of new musical instruments.

SOCIAL SERVICES:

Anchorage Senior Citizens Center and Design (\$70.0). With respect to the appropriation for planning of the Senior Citizens' Center in Anchorage, the appropriation is to be used to research the purposes for which such a center might be used, and to plan and design a structure which will accommodate as many of those purposes as may be practicable. The study should incorporate a study of possible locations of the structure and the estimated costs of the structure at each location, including the cost of transportation. The study shall include preliminary plans and a reasonably accurate cost estimate upon which the legislature can base a capital appropriation in the 1978 session. The contractor or state agency, in con sultation with the Office of Aging Advisory Board, shall prepare the planning and design study and make a report to the Legislature of its findings not later than February 1, 1978. Such

report shall include an itemization of how the appropriation was spent by the Department of Public Works in consultation with the Office of Aging Advisory Board. Any excess funds which are not needed for the study shall be reported to the Legislature for possible reappropriation to the project itself when and if it is approved by the Legislature.

Fairbanks Senior Citizens Center Study (\$50.0). With respect to the appropriation for planning of the Senior Citizens' Center in Fairbanks, the appropriation is to the Department of Public Works to be used to research the purposes for which such a center might be used, and to plan a structure which will accommodate as many of those purposes as may be practicable. The study should incorporate a study of possible locations of the structure and the estimated costs of the structure at each location, including the cost of transportation if the recommended site is not in the downtown area. The study shall include preliminary plans and a reasonably accurate cost estimate upon which the Legislature can base a capital appropriation in the 1978 session. The contractor or state agency preparing the planning study shall make a report to the Legislature of its findings not later than February 1, 1978. Such report shall include an itemization of how the appropriation was spent by the Department; any excess funds which are not needed for the study shall be reported to the Legislature for possible reappropriation to the project itself when and if it is approved by the Legislature.

Galena Headstart Building. The appropriation for the Galena Headstart Building is to be a direct grant to the City of Galena.

NATURAL RESOURCES:

Acoustic Salmon Counters. The capital item for the acoustic salmon counters includes an additional \$169,000 for Copper River Salmon Counting Program.

Fisheries Studies. The capital item for miscellaneous fisheries studies includes grants for the following areas:

Hatchery Feasibility Study. The capital item for the hatchery feasibility study is a grant to the Association of Village Council Presidents Fisheries Development Corporation in Bethel.

Ketchikan Correction Center Planning (\$125.0). Ketchikan Correction Center Planning shall be done in consultation with appropriate local interest groups.

Women & Juvenile Detention Facility, Juneau (\$1,500.0). The Department of Health & Social Services shall hold hearings in Juneau to receive community input prior to planning and construction of the women and juvenile facility.

DEVELOPMENT:

Various Dredging Projects. The capital item for various dredging projects are direct grants to the following three villages:

Napakiak - direct grant, dredging \$25,000 Napaskiak - direct grant, dredging 25,000 Akiachak - direct grant, dredging 25,000

TRANSPORTATION:

Airport Graveling. The six airports to be graveled are:

Chefornak Eek Tuntutuliak Kongiganak Kwigillingok Kipnuk

Marine Transportation Aleutian Coastal Ferry Study (\$300.0). The study is to determine modification or addition to docking facilities, vessel design, and initial route feasibility for phased development of coastal freight ferry and limited passenger service to Alaska Peninsula and Aleutian communities.

Highway Equipment Acquisition (\$872.0). The appropriation includes \$60,000 to purchase a crawler tractor with dozer to provide year-round maintenance of the Lake Harriet Hunt Road, recently added to the State Highway System; and \$60,000 to purchase a grader for use in Quinhagik.

Under the authority of art.II, sec. 15 of the Alaska Constitution, I have today exercised my item-veto authority in the following bill and am transmitting the enrolled and engrossed copies to the Lieutenant Governor's Office for permanent filing:

FREE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 52 (Appropriating for the operating and capital expenses of the state government)

Chapter 153, SLA 1977
The decisions I have made today have not come easily nor been taken lightly. At the beginning of this session I told the legislators and the people of Alaska in the clearest possible terms that I am committed to taking the steps toward changing the potentially disastrous reliance on one-time only oil revenues to pay for the on-going costs of state government. Therefore, I introduced two budgets for the Legislature to consider. One, was a bare bones budget with few new programs, few new employees and few new sources of revenues. The second budget, allowed for increases; but, and this is the key point, also included proposals for \$30 million in new recurrent tax revenues.

After a record 141 days, and passage of 162 bills, unfortunately the Legislature failed to take significant action on means of increasing recurring revenues. Should they have passed the revenue measures I proposed at the beginning of the session, an additional \$32 million would have been available to fund the entire legislatively authorized budget. However, the Legislature

chose to enact revenue measures which provided only about \$1 million more in recurring revenues. Accordingly, to meet my commitment not to expand governmental programs without commensurate recurrent revenues, I was obligated to reduce HB 52 by some \$26 million and other legislation affecting Fiscal 1978 by \$5.7 million thereby reducing the total by \$31.7 million in general funds.

Certainly I would prefer not to have had to make reductions of such magnitude. To have not done so of course would have been the easy politically expedient way out. Not surprisingly I have heard from legislators who have expressed concern for what they deem the vital needs of their districts. I can appreciate such concerns and I welcome comments and suggestions which reflect the interest of a legislator's constituents. While I have done my best to accommodate legislators when they were willing to prioritize those needs within revenues available, some were not willing to do so. While I would have preferred that local representatives more familiar with local circumstances prioritized programs to meet budget constraints, when such was not forthcoming the obligation fell upon myself to represent the statewide interests even though such might be at the expense of a local constituency.

Throughout the state people have consistently expressed their opposition to the size and cost of state government. Most are vocal in that opposition save when it compels specific actions which impact programs endorsed by themselves.

It is obvious that there can be no reduction in the spiraling size of state government or any tapering off of our dependency on non-recurring "nest egg" oil revenues unless difficult decisions are made on the budget. Moreover, when legislative programs exceed appropriate revenues someone must say "no".

In making reductions, some long sought projects were impacted as were some new programs. Virtually every area of the state will find something which the legislature appropriated into the budget that has been removed. I regret that and ask only that you appreciate the difficulty in which such decisions are made. Moreover, I believe through legislatively authorized expenditures were reduced significantly, in most instances vital programs received funding in excess of

the previous year.

It is my hope that future legislative programs which incur additional costs will be accompanied by measures which will provide appropriate revenues to fund them, rather than simply relying further upon depleting resource wealth for such funding. While there may be some dispute and dissention regarding the appropriateness of our budget reductions, the one message which has come home loud and clear and upon which Alaskans seem to be speaking with a single voice is their determination to constrain the growth of government within the limits of appropriate monies available. Our actions today were in response to that voice.

This bill makes a two-year general fund appropriation for delineation of a utility corridor and railroad right-of-way for extension of the Alaska Railroad. Because of budget constraints for fiscal year 1978, I am compelled to reduce the fiscal year 1978 general fund amount from \$430,000 to \$150,000.

It will be said that I am reducing this appropriation because of lack of support for the project. This is not the case. I am reducing the appropriation since to hold fiscal year 1978 expenditures to be equal with total anticipated revenues some \$30 million must come out of the legislative appropriations. This is a difficult task. Reductions must be made in many worthwhile programs which I support, including the railroad project.

It is my understanding that federal funding is available to match this \$150,000 thereby allowing a \$300,000 total funding effort for fiscal year 1978.

The fiscal year 1979 portion of the costs I feel should be evaluated along with other fiscal year 1979 projects during the next legislative session.

I am reducing HB 179, "An Act making a special appropriation to the Department of Education for community schools", from \$1,225,000 to \$150,000. Although a strong supporter of the concept of community schools, I must reluctantly take this action as a means of holding the Fiscal Year 1978 budget to a prudent level.

I must also point out that the passage of this bill is to a degree inappropriate in that the bill is effective July 1, 1977, and should thus have properly been included in the general budget act. In the future I will continue to look dimly at bills which thus attempt to end-run the normal budget process.

In Fiscal Year 1976, \$160,000 was budgeted to begin the community schools program. In Fiscal Year 1977, \$860,000. With my approval of \$150,000 of this bill in combination with that amount funded in the budget Act, community schools will be funded at $\frac{$1,010,000}{$1,010,000}$ for Fiscal Year 1978.

Education programs have consistently been of highest priority to this administration. Again during this session of the legislature, we have, in spite of a continuing financial crunch been able to support substantial increases across-the-board for funding both in the REAA's and in our school districts. The passage of House Bill 212 produces a landmark two-year package of significant education legislation putting many millions of new dollars into all corners of the education community. The passage of legislation aimed at aid to municipal school construction will further add greatly to state contributions to education.

In this setting, and given our overall financial constraints, I feel compelled to hold in check the tremendous expansion of the community schools programs the legislature envisioned. The legislature proposed that the program grow from \$860,000 to \$2 million between fiscal years 1977 and 1978. For this coming year the program will indeed experience an increase in funding. Regrettably, I cannot allow more.

Following a costing of necessary maintenance repair, I will support either a bond proposal or general fund budget measure to alleviate the growing maintenance problem in the rural schools.

Were it not for the financial constraints placed on this year's budget, I would now allow more funding immediately for this purpose.

Dear Mr. President:

I have today vetoed HCSSB 204, (An Act relating to revision of appropriations under the Executive Budget Act). I have done so because I believe it to be clearly unconstitutional. The courts have consistently ruled that delegating the right to make modifications in a state's budget to a legislative committee is impermissible under our Constitution.

If you feel that the Constitution should be changed to confer that power to a legislative committee, then the matter should be placed directly before the people as a constitutional amendment. I hope that you will agree, sustain my veto and approve a resolution to submit to the electorate a constitutional amendment authorizing what the Constitution now prohibits.

If an amendment is adopted, I hope that a procedure will be established to require the interim committee to disapprove transfers and expenditure of federal or program receipts within a specific period of time. If the committee does not take action to refuse the request, by majority vote of the committee, the revisions would be effective and approved. The current system of approval permits veto by one member of the Budget and Audit Committee. If only a quorum is in attendance at the meeting (which has often been the case), a request can be defeated by the no vote of one member of the committee. Currently one member of the Legislature can veto not only the Governor and the rest of the committee, but the Legislature as well.

Relating to revenue collected by the state for other entities; and providing for an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

Sec. 37.20.040. ALASKA NATIVE FUND. The amount required by federal law to be paid into the Alaska Native Fund established by P. L. 92-203 is not revenue of the state, except for the purpose of calculating the amount to be placed in the Alaska Permanent Fund, and shall be paid by the commissioner of revenue to the Alaska Native Fund directly on receipt.

* Sec. 2. This Act takes effect July 1, 1977.
