Making appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses of state government and to capitalize funds; and providing for an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

1 Making appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses of state government and to capitalize
2 funds; and providing for an effective date.

4 * Section 1. Included within the general fund amounts appropriated in this Act, the following
5 amounts are from the unreserved special accounts in the general fund:

6 Highway fuel tax account	\$21,500,000
7 Aviation fuel tax account	11,500,000

8 * Sec. 2. Federal or other program receipts as defined under AS 37.05.146 that exceed the amounts
9 appropriated in this Act are appropriated conditioned upon compliance with the program review
10 provisions of AS 37.07.080(h).

11 * Sec. 3. If federal or other program receipts as defined under AS 37.05.146 exceed the estimates
12 appropriated by this Act, the appropriation from state funds for the affected program may be reduced

As you will note, I have decided to make no additional reductions in the FY 93 operating budget as passed by the Legislature. Working with my budget team and the entire cabinet, candid two-way discussions took place, resulting in budget cuts that bring this budget below 1992 spending levels. Alaska's fiscal policy-makers have started to tackle the difficult questions which will continue to face not only the Legislature in the years to come, but each individual Alaskan as well.

I realize some Alaskans will criticize my decision--and will continue to call for further cuts. I agree that more cost reductions are necessary. I am committed to restructuring our government to achieve these reductions while maintaining necessary services to the people of Alaska. I do respect the process the Legislature used this session by seriously examining the varied programs and services state government provides its citizens and making some tough decisions on reductions.

For these reasons, I have signed the Legislature's FY 93 operating budget into law. To those who have the perception that state spending was not cut, I take this opportunity to point out the following:

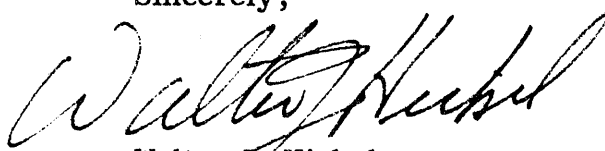

- * Funding for agency operations was reduced \$37.3 million, while at the same time we absorbed nearly \$15 million in cost of living increases for some state employees;
- * Funding for formula-driven programs, such as the longevity bonus, public assistance, and medicaid, increased \$28.6 million;
- * The combination of the above two items required severe cuts throughout other government services and programs.

As my administration works to implement the FY 93 operating budget, Alaskans will see some changes as a result of these reductions. I am directing my cabinet to continue providing quality basic services needed by Alaskans, while looking for ways to reduce the cost and size of state government.

The budget issues we have faced this year will not go away. Our state government, in partnership with the private sector, must forge new economic development initiatives to maintain and create jobs and to improve state revenues. We need the support of all Alaskans in this endeavor.

Dear President Eliason:

As Governor I am once again faced with a tough decision regarding Alaska's public education system. Should I hold school funding at it's current level of \$60,000 per instructional unit or allow it to increase to \$61,000?

If I approve House Bill 25 it will increase the cost of the public school foundation program by more than 58 million dollars, or 11 percent, since I took office. Furthermore, costs will likely increase another 15 or 20 million dollars this coming school year due to enrollment increases. It is hard for me to believe that public schools need so much money when private schools educate students so well with far less.

Let's consider this funding issue for a moment. Alaska has been generous to its public school system. We have funded it at a high level for many years. Yet parents all across our state continue to tell me their children are not getting the education they need to be successful adults. Many people urge me not to put more money into a system that is producing far below its capacity. Employers often point to the high cost of school employee salaries and benefits and caution me that increased funding will go to employees, not students. Our citizens are saying that they have lost control of their schools to the educational bureaucracy. I must ask myself, the Legislature, and the Alaskan people whether this is the kind of system we want to support through increased funding.

On the other hand, although I am not satisfied with the current performance of our educational system, I recognize that education costs have risen considerably since 1987, when the foundation unit was set at \$60,000. I am also encouraged by the responsible actions of some school districts to curb costs, increase local taxes and eliminate unnecessary programs. Additionally, the Alaska 2000 education initiative promises a frontal attack on the major problems facing our educational system. Alaska 2000 will define precisely what an Alaskan education should be, establish responsible funding and school construction programs, and ensure that each student has access to an education measured not by 12 years of seat time but by the specific attainment of skills.

I have decided to sign into law House Bill 25 which increases funding to \$61,000 per instructional unit that will add 12 million dollars to the education budget. This increase is combined with a 15 million dollar cost savings to school districts as a result of the recent change in the teacher retirement system. This is effectively a 27 million dollar increase for school districts. I take this action to provide temporary stability to the education system while we make necessary improvements. However, I sign the bill into law with this admonition: I will veto any further increases to the foundation program until we address the serious problems of cost and quality, and reinstate effective public control over our schools.

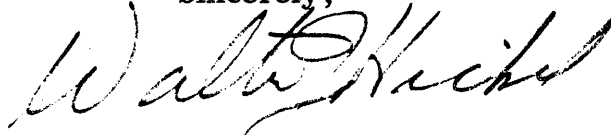

On this date I have signed, with line item vetoes and reductions, the following bill and am transmitting the engrossed and enrolled copies to the Lieutenant Governor's Office for permanent filing:

COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR
SENATE BILL NO. 483 (2d FINANCE) am

(An Act making supplemental and special appropriations for the expenses of state government; making, amending, and repealing appropriations; and providing for an effective date.)

Chapter No. 5, FSSLA 1992

I was able to approve funding for many of the projects which help meet some of the basic needs in Alaska's communities--from water and sewer improvements in rural and urban Alaska, to improving our roads and highways, to making our schools safe and sound for our students.

The FY93 capital budget provides funding for:

- * \$66.3 million in education projects, which include K - 12 improvements as well as projects for the University of Alaska;
- * \$457.7 million (\$70.2 million in general funds) in transportation-related projects;
- * \$55.4 million in public protection and health/life safety projects; and

- * \$40.3 million in water and sewer projects throughout the state.

The Legislature's capital expenditures included over \$741.7 million in total funds, of which \$324.5 million was from the state's general fund. Of this amount, I vetoed \$26.3 million (\$24 million in general funds). Each dollar in this decision reflects a tough call. However, in reviewing the capital budget it was important that statewide priorities be set and clear decisions made as to what services Alaska's government should be providing its citizens. This process resulted in some tough choices, but they were choices which had to be made.

In approving the capital budget, the Legislature added intent language asking that communities share in the cost of local projects. That language embraces the spirit of the capital matching grants program which I proposed in legislation during the last Legislature. Based on this intent, each community and organization provided my budget team with information about how they could "match" part of their project costs. Responses ranged from donation of land, to locally-generated tax revenues, to volunteer labor. I was pleased with the level of commitment the Legislature, communities, and organizations showed and appreciate their understanding of this important concept. It is my intent to introduce legislation again next year to permanently establish this concept.

In addition to the reduction of \$26.3 million, I have vetoed sections 156-198 of this bill relating to the proposed projects funded by the \$50 million EXXON VALDEZ criminal restitution payment. This was an especially difficult decision because the list included such worthwhile projects as the Kachemak Bay land purchase, the acquisition of lands near Cordova and other Prince William Sound enhancement projects. I have been a longtime supporter of some of these projects and remain steadfast in my commitment to see several of the projects implemented. However, for the reasons set forth below, the veto was necessary.

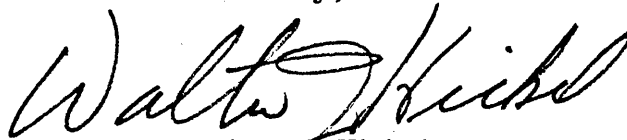
- * I have been advised by the Department of Law that under the language and the intent of the court restrictions placed on the use of this money, several of the projects are illegal.
- * I have concerns about spending this money now, when we do not have sufficient data yet on how to best address the damage resulting from the oil spill. The public interest demands that we act cautiously in spending the restitution money so that we preserve our long-term ability to undertake actions in the future, when more is known about the long-term impacts of the spill.
- * The creation and use of an endowment, as I proposed in legislation, is superior to the outright expenditures proposed in this bill. An endowment would allow earnings to be used or pledged for clearly identified needs, while the principal of the

endowment would remain available for the long term for those needs that are now unknown or not yet proven. Therefore, I believe that the creation of an endowment for these funds is essential for proper management. I intend to resubmit legislation next session to accomplish this important goal. My action to veto these appropriations today is not a reflection on the merits of any particular project, but rather to protect these funds to be sure that the adverse impacts of the nation's largest oil spill are properly addressed.

Without other major revenue enhancement projects coming on line soon, Alaskans will soon have the challenge of learning how to adjust our lifestyle to one which we can afford. Important in this process will be re-learning the basics about government's responsibilities to its citizens by taking care of what we have already, and investing wisely today to secure the future. I think the final version of the capital budget takes some steps in this direction.

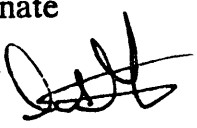
