Since the retirement of Justice Jay Rabinowitz more than 10 years ago, there has not been a sitting supreme court justice in Fairbanks. In January 2008 Justice Daniel Winfree began serving in Fairbanks as a supreme court justice taking the place of retired Justice Alexander Bryner. The employees that supported retired Justice Bryner were Anchorage-based positions. Unlike Fairbanks, Anchorage does not have a geographic differential added to the base salary amounts paid employees. The court system is seeking additional funding to cover the increased personal services expenses for appellate court staff that will now be serving in Fairbanks. This annual cost will be \$33,400.

The justices from Juneau and Fairbanks require administrative assistance while they are working in Anchorage. In the past, supporting the Juneau justice was accomplished through a coordinated effort and distribution of the additional work among the clerical staff supporting the Anchorage-based justices. With the appointment of a Fairbanks-based justice, the need for extra administrative support required has now doubled, although the number of Anchorage-based judicial assistants has been reduced by one. When a justice is not in his or her home chambers, that justice cannot produce work without the assistance of local staff. This includes circulating new draft opinions, circulating voting memos, and proofreading opinions for publication. Additionally, with the

currently the only district without a rural court trainer position. Although the second district has fewer clerical staff than the other districts, it has proportionally higher turnover in clerical positions. This proportionally higher turnover requires training to be conducted with greater frequency. This position will provide administrative, technical, and clerical assistance to rural courts in program areas such as case processing, fiscal procedures, personnel management, customer service, and general court management. The position will travel regularly to rural courts to assess compliance with court system rules, policies and procedures and will serve as rural clerk of court or deputy magistrate during clerical vacancies or extended staff absences.

The Kotzebue and Barrow superior courts are clerically staffed with one clerk of court and four deputy clerks. Due to the minimal number of staff within these courts, adequate staffing is not always available to address both the in-court and "front counter" customer service needs of these courts. These two courts are also plagued with excessive vacancies and high turnover rates. These conditions further negatively impact the staffing issues within the second district courts. Kotzebue and Barrow courts are each seeking an additional permanent full-time deputy court clerk. This clerk position will manage telephone communications, jury coordination and walk-in customers, who are there to make payments, file cases, obtain forms and ask a myriad of questions. Customer service is severely impacted by the limited number of staffing within the clerk's office. Following is court-specific case filing information that has impacted the operations of these second district courts:

Kotzebue trial court's superior court case filings are up 38% and district court case filings are up 29% from FY04 to FY05. This position and related expenses will cost approximately \$76,500.

Barrow trial court's superior court felony case filings are up 53% from FY04 to FY05. Case filings increased by 26% for children's matters and by 32% for domestic relations from FY04 to FY05. This position and related expenses will cost approximately \$85,200.

Third District

The third district requests \$488,500 for eight permanent, full-time positions. Each position is described below.

Dillingham superior court, which is the only superior court that does not have a law clerk, requests a permanent full-time law clerk. Early in this court's history, case loads were small in comparison with other superior court sites and it was decided that a law clerk was not required. This is no longer the case for this court, which in addition to its increased caseload is regularly called upon to cover superior court cases in Unalaska and Naknek. Case fillings totals in FY05 are 42% greater than in FY97 when the Dillingham superior court judicial position was created. Population for this area has increased 22.7% from 1990 to 2000. Criminal case fillings for this court are up 22%, childrens matters' filings are up 61% and domestic relations case fillings are up 22% comparing FY05 case fillings against FY04 case fillings. This position and related expenses is estimated to cost \$71,900.

Palmer trial courts requests three permanent, full-time court clerks. The caseload for the Palmer court has steadily increased. This increase is in line with burgeoning population increases in the region. Comparing the 1990 census data against the 2000 census data, the Borough's population grew by 49.5%. Population growth for the entire state was only 14% during this same period. From April 2000 to July 2004, the Mat-su Borough's population grew by 21.8% compared with the rest of the state, which increased by only 4.5%. Statistically, case

Under AS 22.20.037(c), the court system is required to conduct an annual salary survey to ensure that court employees receive salaries that are consistent with salaries paid to the classified and partially exempt state employees in the executive branch. In the early 1990's, the court system did not receive the 3.3% raise that employees in the executive branch received for the cost of living increase and the following year the court employees voted in a union. The union has now been decertified, but the court has been vigilant about reviewing the court's salaries for parity with the executive branch.

The most common compensation concern raised by court employees is the discontinuation of annual merit increases upon reaching "F" step. For FY01, the largest union in the executive branch - the General Government Unit - negotiated a revised salary schedule that added a "G" step between the "F" step and the first longevity step.

The MH Trust: Dis Justice - Increased Case Coordinator Capacity - Anchorage Mental Health Court is a position needed to maintain the positive momentum and success of the Anchorage Mental Health Court. This position will provide additional slots for participation in this therapeutic court as well as enhance the quality of court supervision. The funding and its incorporation into the existing model will be managed by the Alaska Court System.

The Anchorage Mental Health Court is at a juncture where the need for an additional case coordinator is required. Current caseloads are at or above capacity, resulting in a waitlist for participation. At the end of FY07 there were sixteen clients on the waitlist, with an average wait of 21.9 days for clients out-of-custody and 15.6 days for clients in-custody prior to their initial opt in.

This position maintains the momentum of a critical component of the Disability Justice Focus Area plan by enhancing the Anchorage Mental Health Court's ability to identify the underlying reasons for an individual's contact with the criminal justice system, to develop a court ordered treatment plan that addresses treatment needs and to provide for monitoring by the court. The objective is in decreasing risk of future contacts with the criminal justice system, care within a correctional or the psychiatric institution and the associated high costs. Court System staff will provide outcome data on how the funding is utilized and associated cost savings as well as the number of individuals served and their outcomes.

In past years the court system used prepaid phone cards extensively to save on toll costs for long-distance phone calls. These cards were particularly useful for instate calls as local carriers charged from \$0.115 to \$0.18 per minute. With a prepaid phone card, the court system was paying \$0.0283 or less than three cents per minute for calls made with a Sprint prepaid calling card. Effective October 2008, Sprint sold its interest in prepaid calling cards to a carrier that was unable to provide the instate calling services at the rates formerly offered by Sprint and did not have the facilities to insure that calls made to remote locations would be of sufficient quality to conduct court business. The court system pursued other prepaid calling card vendors, but none could provide a reliable service at less cost than amounts charged by the local carriers, two of which have agreed to charge \$0.10 per minute for instate calls. The court system is requesting \$42,000 to pay for these increased telephony costs.

The court system regularly conducts hearings telephonically. By court rule, parties convenienced by holding a hearing telephonically must pay the cost of the hearing. The court pays the telephone cost if the judge is able to avoid traveling to the hearing (cost savings measure). For other situations, the defendant, public defender, plaintiff or prosecution would be responsible for the cost of the call. Frequently the payer is another state agency. In the past, the in-court clerk would collect calling cards from the payers and place the calls. This was time-consuming and caused delays in court proceedings. To address the efficiency issue in high-volume proceedings with multiple parties in attendance, the court piloted a project wherein the court system used a teleconferencing service to coordinate the calls. Using the service resolved many issues and placed the burden of calling into the hearing on the parties rather than on the in-court court clerk who frequently had to track down parties who may be at home, on their cell phone, at their office, etc. The vendor is extremely reliable is extremely reliable and charges \$0.059 per minute for each caller. The court system is requesting \$56,000 in additional funding to expand the pilot project to include all telephonic proceedings and to pay the long-distance charges for telephonic proceedings that would generally be borne by another state agency.

In the Alaska Court System's FY09, FY10, and FY11 budget requests, funding was sought for the "No Dark Courtrooms" initiative to improve courtroom efficiency around the state. A portion of the funding requested has been appropriated each year with the understanding that the court would seek further funding during subsequent legislative sessions. This initiative is integral to the court system's long-range planning effort. Past appropriations have supported projects in Palmer, Anchorage and Fairbanks that improved courtroom efficiency by streamlining proceedings. In these locations, a second in-court clerk is now present during high volume proceedings so that case paperwork can be generated and distributed to parties in the courtroom, and data essential to public safety can be recorded in the court's electronic systems, making it immediately accessible throughout the justice system. Judgments, bail conditions, and other court orders are available to defendants and attorneys without delay, promoting compliance and eliminating the need for subsequent paper processing and mailing. These improvements are not only a benefit to the court, but also to corrections, state and local law enforcement, and other justice agencies.

Using funding for this initiative, the court system was also able to add new court clerk positions in Anchorage,

Child Custody Mediation - Mediation offers parents an opportunity to create co-parenting plans for their children in a non-adversarial, confidential, informal setting with a trained and experienced neutral mediator. This request is an outgrowth of the success of the mediation services provided through the court system's Child Custody and Visitation Mediation Program (CCVMP) for over 10 years. Over a recent 18-month period, referrals to mediation increased sharply, resulting in a 250 percent increase in costs, an amount not sustainable by the federal grant that funds this program. The court system seeks to leverage grant funds to provide an important continuum of mediation services to parents and maximize court resources. The focus of state funding will be to assist parents in conflict over physical and legal custody issues regarding their children and the initial court filing, prior to a decree.

Mediation is not appropriate in every case and this project will develop referral protocols, including screening for domestic violence for the more than 3,000 annual filings, about 54 percent of which are pre-decree, involving custody disputes in domestic relations cases. The pool of private contract mediators will be expanded and given specialized training. The program will evaluate its outcomes, including the impact of early mediation on later litigation and expects to find that successful mediation of the initial co-parenting plan results in a significant decrease in later contested motions for modifications.

Child in Need of Aid (CINA) Mediation - Funds are needed to expand the CINA mediation program in Juneau. In the past two years, the Juneau court has used the CINA mediation program quite heavily to successfully resolve CINA and CINA-related cases. At this point, the program's proven track record supports changing it from a grant-funded pilot project to a permanent mediation location.

Judicial Settlement Conferences - High-conflict parents with communication issues and differing assessments of their own likelihood of success at trial often can benefit from the more evaluative or directed approach of a judge in a settlement conference setting. These individuals often present difficult management challenges during the pretrial litigation phase and in the adversarial setting of the trial itself.

Early Neutral Evaluation - Some parents are motivated to negotiate their own agreement, but they are stymied by significantly differing notions of the likelihood of prevailing at trial, often because they do not understand the factors that guide the judge's custody decision. These parents can benefit from referral to an experienced custody evaluator who can explain the salient factors, evaluate the particular needs of the children, and help the parents negotiate an agreement that meets those needs.

Two CMS (Case Management System) analysts are needed to support ongoing conversions of courts to CourtView, the software used for case management, to implement CMS-related initiatives, and to maintain CourtView once it is installed. A contracts and leasing manager is needed to manage leases for court space and tenant space, and service contracts for janitorial, snow removal and other building services for the 42 court facilities operated by the court system. Additionally, this position will manage numerous small construction projects related to tenant improvements and maintenance work throughout the year. The majority of this work relates to recurring responsibilities funded with leasing and building maintenance operating budget funds. This position is estimated to cost \$87.500.

The court system's security needs have grown to the point at which a senior staff position is needed to oversee statewide security demands. This position will be responsible for security management and public relations, employee and judicial officer security, building security, information technology security, and emergency preparedness and planning. This position will serve as the court system's liaison with the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Homeland Security on court security matters. The estimated cost of this position is \$124,800.

An additional shop technician is needed in information services to help support ongoing and new projects using infrastructure technologies supported by technical staff. Examples of these projects include replacement of PCs and printers to insure end user equipment is updated with current technology to support new applications; a new network-based digital audio recording system; a new security system for the Anchorage court campus; expansion of the case management system into other court locations; and telephone systems. This position is estimated to cost \$75.200.

Fiscal operations requires an additional accounting position to handle the increased demands for management of accounting records associated with grants, reimbursable services agreements, contracts, and general audit requirements. The fiscal operations department is minimally staffed within the accounting area. Administration requests \$310,500 for three permanent full-time positions. These requests are described below:

Fiscal operations needs an additional records technician to maintain continuous case file document scanning and to ensure timely responses to public record requests for documents that are available only on microfilm, which is cumbersome to access. This position will assist with the court system's imaging project, which is an effort to scan and digitize court records for improved access by court staff, other agencies such as the Child Support Services Division, and the public. With additional staffing, the records management division will be able to expedite the scanning and digitizing of court documents for more efficient and timely access. This position is estimated to cost \$69,800.

Increasingly, the court system is working to improve information sharing by developing interfaces to other agencies' data systems. These efforts require oversight by a programmer/analyst. The position will concentrate on enhancements of existing court systems and deployment of new solutions to improve data sharing. The position will work with MAJIC (the Multi-Agency Justice Integration Consortium) to implement interagency data exchanges using data exchange standards and technologies designed to improve the efficiency of the criminal justice system as a whole. The programmer/analyst will assist the court and other MAJIC agencies with technical design and development of integrated justice projects. Additionally, the position will evaluate and make recommendations involving data exchange project proposals, technologies, tools, and quality control, and train MAJIC members and contractors in relevant technologies. This position is estimated to cost \$111,700.

The court system operates 44 court facilities, most of which are leased from private landlords or other government entities. The court system has never receiving funding for a permanent, full-time contracts and leasing manager, relying instead on project-funded employees to perform this work. The contracts and leasing manager will: (1) Work with court staff to identify space needs and technical requirements for new leases and service contracts; (2)

There are 51 magistrates and masters in Alaska. Magistrates and masters are not appointed by the Governor, nor are their qualifications reviewed by the Alaska Judicial Council. Their appointments are made for an indefinite period by the presiding judge of the judicial district in which they serve. They serve at the pleasure of the presiding judge, and are not subject to retention elections like Alaskan judges and justices.

In 1997 and 2001, the Court asked the Judicial Council to gather information for a performance evaluation of these judicial officers, many of whom are the sole judicial officers in the locations they serve. The Council surveyed Alaskan attorneys and peace and probation officers and shared the results with the Count. The Count would like the Council to conduct judicial performance surveys about magistrates and masters in FY2007. The Council seeks funding for this project. Requested funds will be used to survey design, editing and transcription (3.0), printing, bulk mail and postage (4.1), hosting of electronic surveys (6.0), and data entry and analysis (18.2).

Alaska Administrative Rule of Court 23 permits the Alaska COurt System to assign caseloads to retired judges for a period up to two years. The rule requires the Alaska Judicial Council to evaluate the performance of these judges by surveying members of the bar in the judicial districts where the judges have served. An evaluation must be done so that the Court may determine the eligibility of these judges to continue to serve pro tem. The Council has not been provided with any additional funding to conduct these evaluations. The Council anticipates that it will need to evaluate five pro tem judges in FY2007.

The Council requires funding in the amoung of 9.2 for survey design, editing and transcription (.7); printing, bulk mail processing and postage (1.7); hosting of electronic survey (2.5); data entry and analysis (4.3).

Except for one-time funding in FY 07 to evaluate applicants for six new judgeships created by the legislature, the Council's budget for selection costs has been based on a pre-2003 historical average of 4 vacancies a year. From 2003 - 2007, the average number of vacancies per year was 7.2.1

In 2008, 6 vacancies occurred. There are more judgeships than in the past and the judiciary is aging. In addition to more vacancies, there have been many more applicants per vacancy in recent years,2 a trend that is expected to continue due to judicial pay raises.

The Council has no control over the number of judicial vacancies or the number of judicial applicants. The Council needs additional funds to meet its increased responsibility in the area of judicial selection. In FY09, due to the high number of vacancies, the Council required supplemental funding for the first time in more than 20 years. The legislature provided the funding but did not increase the Council's base budget to enable the Council to meet its increased judicial selection workload in future years.

Based on its experience since 2003, the Council seeks \$63,600 to cover its increased judicial selection costs. These funds will permit the Council to screen applicants for 7 vacancies per year. This amount does not include any personal service costs even though the Council has fewer full-time staff than it did before 2003.
