Dear Representative Grussendorf:

Re: CCSHB 60 -- appropriations for the operating and loan program expenses of State government.

(Chapter 98, SLA 1985)

Under Article 11, Section 15, of the Alaska Constitution, I have signed into law Conference Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 60. At the same time, I have exercised my line-item veto authority to reduce or eliminate a number of appropriations in the bill. These line-item reductions or vetoes total about \$2.7 million in general funds, leaving about \$2.34 billion in general funds appropriated for the total operating and loan program expenses of State government in Fiscal Year 1986.

As a fast-growing state, Alaska is under enormous pressure to provide vital public services. This pressure is compounded during the coming fiscal year by a sharp downturn in projected revenues. In turn, these competing forces are reflected in the budget decisions we had to make during the 1985 legislative session.

While I disagree with some of the budget decisions made by the House and Senate, I would like to commend the Legislature for its overall approach in developing this operating and loan program budget. At \$1.95 billion the nearly two

percent reduction in general fund expenses for the operation of State agencies is consistent with the stark reality of declining world oil prices which affect the vast majority of the State's revenue. Moreover, this reduction is consistent with the very modest budget growth experience by State government during fiscal years 1984 and 1985, compared to the huge annual budget increases of the past decade.

I'm convinced a continuation of this responsible approach to the State operating budget will serve Alaskans well in the years ahead, when our current major source of income -- the Prudhoe Bay oil field -- begins its inevitable production decline. This approach, coupled with a sound investment and special deposit program for the Alaska Permanent Fund, will keep our State on sound financial footing for many years to come.

The Permanent Fund, as you know, is the largest savings account we have. It is not, however, the only one. Five years ago, the Legislature set aside a reserve for emergency operating expenses to be used in the event of a catastrophe—for example, a major breakdown in the Trans-Alaska Pipeline that would interrupt the flow of State revenue.

In 1985, the Legislature attempted to tap into this emergency reserve, known as the "Rainy Day Account," to help fund the operations of State government. I don't believe that was wise; in fact, our preliminary analysis indicates this appropriation was not correctly drafted and may be a nullity. In any event, although we have significantly less revenue than in past years, Alaska does not face an emergency of the magnitude envisioned when this account was established in the general fund. Therefore, in acting on this bill and two other appropriation and reappropriation bills adopted by the 1985 Legislature, I have chosen to reduce general fund appropriations to balance the budget.

In this legislation, for example, I have chosen to reduce the "leadership funds" in both houses. I have done this for several reasons. In a year when operating items, including the contingency fund within the Governor's Office, have needed to be reduced, it is appropriate for the Legislature's own contingency funds to be reduced. In addition, these funds have been the source of some controversy inside and outside the Legislature, and you may want to consider

alternative methods for funding some of your operating expenses in the future. The difference in the amount of the reduction in each budget is based chiefly on the House's having twice as many elected representatives as the Senate.

Re: CSSB 27 (Fin) -Making special appropriations for capital projects; and providing for an effective date.
(Chapter 96, SLA 1985)

Under Article II, Section 15, of the Alaska Constitution, I have signed into law Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 27 (Finance). At the same time, I have exercised my line-item veto authority to reduce or eliminate a number of capital projects contained in the bill. These line-item reductions or vetoes total \$35.8 million in general funds, leaving \$433 million in general funds appropriated for a variety of projects across the state.

My decision to veto projects in this legislation was a difficult one, made necessary by the combined fiscal impact of this bill and two other appropriation and reappropriation bills adopted by the 1985 Legislature in its closing hours. By the Administration's preliminary calculations, the combined fiscal impact of those three bills could be to overdraw the State general fund by approximately \$50 million in Fiscal Year 1986. This would violate the State constitutional prohibition against deficit spending.

In an effort to balance the budget, I have vetoed from this bill a number of otherwise worthy projects the Legislature

may wish to consider for funding in Fiscal Year 1987. In addition, I draw your attention once again to several critical projects proposed by the Administration which failed to receive funding. Among those, funds for the completion of the Anchorage Accelerated Road Program and repairs to the Dillingham airport runway, should be considered top priorities next session.

One consideration I made in reducing the level of funding for some projects was the enactment of a new formula by the 1985 Legislature for State reimbursement of local school construction debt. Under Chapter 78, SLA 1985, the State will pay for 80 percent, instead of 50 percent in previous years, of the cost of certain local school projects. This change not only will help hold down local property taxes, but also will allow voters to set priorities for local school construction.

Because this new law underscores the partnership between State and local governments in Alaska, I have chosen to reduce the level of funding contained in this bill for several major school projects across the state. This reduction will allow the projects to go forward on a timely basis, yet may require the affected communities to hold school bond elections this year or next to supplement the funding contained in this bill. In any event, the State will continue to pay for the vast majority of school construction costs throughout the state.

While it was necessary for me to reduce the size of the general fund appropriations in this bill, I would like to commend the House and Senate for fashioning a capital construction budget which, in general, makes the most of the limited dollars available unlike some capital spending bills I have seen in the past. Overall, Alaska's basic needs for transportation, education, health, and safety will be met through the enactment of this bill.

Re: SCS CSHB 195 (Fin) am S -- Making, amending, transferring, and repealing capital appropriations; and providing for an effective date. (Chapter No. 105, SLA 1985)

Under Article II, Section 15 of the Alaska Constitution, I have signed into law Senate Committee Substitute for Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 195 (Finance). At the same time, I have exercised my line-item veto authority to reduce or eliminate a number of appropriations and repeals in the bill. These line-item reductions or vetoes total about \$10 million in general funds.

In general, my review and approval of appropriations in this bill was based on a need to balance the budget, as mandated by the State constitution. The Administration's preliminary calculations indicated the combined fiscal impact of this bill and the operating and capital budgets would be to overdraw the State general fund by nearly \$50 million in general funds. Since I have already vetoed \$35.8 million from the capital budget and \$2.7 million in the operating budget, vetoes for all three bills total \$48.5 million.

This bill was particularly difficult to review since for the most part it took previously appropriated money and reappropriated it for new purposes. In a number of instances, the Administration and the Legislature differed over the amount actually available for reappropriation. Although previous

reappropriations bills have had a net zero effect, this bill was intended to lapse more money than reappropriated in order to balance the operating and capital budgets. However, the Administration's action on this bill represents our most current and accurate information of what money is actually available for reappropriation.

In several instances, technical irregularities have required that I exercise the governorship's item reduction veto prerogative in a novel manner to preserve or clarify otherwise defective provisions. As typically exercised, the item reduction veto is used to reduce a sum appropriated by the Legislature. However, the constitutional authority for the Governor to exercise an item reduction veto is not limited to this method, and indeed, the form of appropriation enacted by the Legislature cannot serve to impair constitutional responsibility to review my appropriation. For example, where the Legislature reappropriated funds through use of the "deletion and insertion" method, the only manner to reduce the amount reappropriated--short of a full veto--is to increase the amount inserted by the Legislature. I used this form of item reduction veto in section 448. Similarly, in section 749, I exercised my item reduction authority through deletion of a narrative form of appropriation and inserted in its place, a specific sum to be lapsed.

Section 454 attempted to reduce an old general fund appropriation to the emergency operating account. Our analysis has revealed a serious problem in this section. The problem is the appropriation amended has been fully expended and the balance is zero. Therefore, while the section takes effect, it does nothing; however, its existence permits the negotiated pay raise to be honored.

For the past two and a half years, I have made reform of the capital budget a high priority. I am pleased to note that based on my recommendations, the Legislature has substantially tightened up its criteria for judging capital projects. I commend the Legislature once again for the quality of projects that appear in this legislation, making my decisions to veto difficult ones. However, once again, our approval generally went to projects that serve basic needs—such as roads, water and sewer, harbors, and especially those projects that rank high on a community's priority list. However, even in times of austerity, I believe our spirit needs nourishment also, and so I have approved a number of arts and recreation projects.

The Legislature and the Administration went to great efforts this year to identify money that had previously been appropriated, but not spent. The need for a reappropriations measure will continue to exist; however, since most of the old money has been identified and re-spent, I consider it highly unlikely a measure of this magnitude will occur again. The Legislature will once again have to return to using new revenues to pay for operating expenses and capital projects.

\* Section 1. AS 37.15.410 is amended to read:

Sec. 37.15.410. BOND AUTHORIZATION. For the purpose of providing part or all of the money to be used, with or without any grants or other money that [WHICH] may become available, the issuance and sale of revenue bonds of the state in the total principal sum of not to exceed \$100,825,000 [\$62,825,000] is authorized to acquire, equip, construct, and install the additions, improvements, extensions, and facilities authorized in AS 37.15.510. The principal of and interest on these bonds shall be paid out of and secured by the gross revenues derived by the state from the ownership, lease, use, and operation of the airports, and of all the facilities of them and out of any other revenues or money that [WHICH] the state legislature may provide exclusive of any state tax or license.

#### AN ACT

Relating to the authorization of bonds or notes for the DeLong Mountain transportation project, establishing conditions under which the bonds or notes may be issued; and providing for an effective date.

- \* Section 1. The Alaska Industrial Development Authority is authorized to issue bonds or notes in a principal amount not to exceed \$175,000,000 to provide financing for the DeLong Mountain transportation project.
- \* Sec. 2. Before bonds or notes authorized under sec. 1 of this Act may be issued, the Alaska Industrial Development Authority shall comply with AS 44.88.173 and shall incorporate into the final finance plan and agreement for the DeLong Mountain transportation project the following terms and conditions:
  - (1) Cominco, Ltd. is required to agree in writing that
  - (A) Cominco, Ltd. will pay for all or a portion of the operation and maintenance of facilities constructed as part of the project based on the use Cominco Alaska makes of the facilities compared to the use made by others;
  - (B) if Cominco Alaska ceases to develop the Red Dog Mine after costs have been incurred by the Alaska Industrial Development Authority for the project, Cominco, Ltd. will pay the authority for those costs together with interest from the date the costs were incurred;

- (7) reasonable access to the port and road is guaranteed to all users and potential users:
- (8) the Alaska Industrial Development Authority will own and operate the facilities collectively referred to as the Delong Mountain transportation project.
- \* Sec. 3. Before bonds or notes authorized under sec. 1 of this Act may be issued, the Alaska Industrial Development Authority shall
- (!) report in writing to the legislative budget and audit committee that the conditions under sec. 2 of this Act have been met; and
- (2) agree with the Department of Revenue in writing to deliver all money generated by the DeLong Mountain transportation project to the Department of Revenue for deposit in the general fund, other than money necessary for payment of the principal and interest on bonds or notes issued under sec. I of this Act and except as may otherwise be provided in the bond or note covenants.
- \* Sec. 4. As used in this Act, "reasonable return" means a rate of return on the total investment of the state of at least five percent.

- \* Section 1. The governor is authorized to lend up to \$3,400,000 to the Department of Administration, division of risk management, from the assets of the disaster relief fund (AS 44.19.048) to alleviate the effects of a breakwater failure on St. Paul Island.
- \* Sec. 2. A loan made under the authority of sec. 1 of this Act shall be made on the condition that the Department of Administration, division of risk management, repay to the disaster relief fund the proceeds of insurance payments received as a result of the breakwater failure on St. Paul Island.
- \* Sec. 3. The authority given by sec. 1 of this Act terminates June 30, 1985.
- \* Sec. 4. This Act takes effect immediately in accordance with AS 01.-10.070(c).

Transferring and appropriating certain loans to the economic development fund and the commercial fishing revolving loan fund, transferring and appropriating money to the economic development fund; and providing for an effective date.

\* Section 1. (a) All right, title, and interest in loans of the type described in (b) of this section, and all right, title, and interest in all mortgages, notes, and other instruments of security made in connection with those loans, purchased or acquired by the Department of Revenue and held in the general fund on July 1, 1985, are transferred and appropriated to the economic development fund (AS 44.88.172) of the Alaska Industrial Development Authority for the DeLong Mountain transportation project. However, if the amount in unpaid principal of the loans exceeds \$112,000,000 as of July 1, 1985, only loans and instruments of security totaling \$112,000,000 in unpaid principal are transferred and appropriated under this section.

- (b) This section transfers and appropriates
  - (1) veterans loans acquired or made under AS 26.15;
  - small business loans acquired or made under AS 45.95;
  - tourism loans acquired or made under AS 45.90;
  - (4) fisheries enhancement loans acquired or made under AS 16.10;
  - (5) child care loans acquired or made under AS 44.33; and
  - (6) historical district loans acquired or made under AS 45.98.

- \* Sec. 4. The sum of \$12,000,000 is transferred and appropriated from the multifamily housing loans security fund (AS 44.88.156(h)) to the economic development fund (AS 44.88.172) for the purpose of financing the DeLong Mountain transportation project.
- \* Sec. 5. The appropriation made by sec. 2 of this Act is for capitalization of a loan fund and does not lapse in accordance with AS 37.25.010.
- \* Sec. 6. The appropriations made by secs. 1 and 3 of this Act are for a capital project and are subject to AS 37.25.020.

\* Section 1. The governor is authorized to spend more than \$1,000,000 from the assets of the disaster relief fund (AS 44.19.048) to alleviate the effects of disasters as defined in AS 44.19.050 that result from floods occurring at any place within the state.

\* Sec. 2. Under the authority given by sec. 1 of this Act the governor may not spend more than the assets of the disaster relief fund.

\* Sec. 3. The authority given by sec. 1 of this Act terminates January 15, 1986.

\* Sec. 4. This Act takes effect immediately in accordance with AS 01.- 10.070(c).
